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# LCNG-TERM ARRANGEMENT REGARDING INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN COTTON TEXTILES

## Notifications under Article 2

Attached are notifications, in connexion with Article 2 of the Long-Term Arrangement, transmitted to the secretariat by the Governments of Australia, Austria, Denmark, Norway, Sweden and the United States and by the Commission of the European Economic Community in response to GATT/AIR/495 dated 29 September 1965.

# AUSTRALIA

## Quota or import restrictions referred to in Article 2

- 1. Australia has no restrictions or quotas operating on cotton textiles as of 1 October 1965.
- 2. This position is unchanged from 1 October 1963.
- 3. No changes in restrictions or quotas are envisaged during the remainder of the Arrangement.

As can be seen from the above tables the annual increase in quotas amounted to 19 per cent in relation to the base period. This percentage corresponds to the Austrian obligation under Annex A to increase in the course of the five years for which the Arrangement shall remain in force the quotas by 95 per cent.

## 3. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas envisaged during the last year of the</u> <u>Arrangement</u>

In accordance with Annex A of the Arrangement the import quotas will again be increased for the fifth year of the Arrangement by 19 per cent. Consequently, the following quotas will be opened:

## DENMARK

Quotas or import restrictions

1. No changes have taken place or are envisaged in the quotas fixed in the bilateral arrangement between Denmark and Japan which were notified to the secretariat in December 1963 and reproduced in document COT/25.

2. Denmark still maintains a quota for import of cotton yarn from the United Arab Republic. The quota, the size of which is based on the import of the said product from the United Arab Republic in 1962 (D.Kr.9.4 million) is increased yearly by 3 per cent in accordance with Annex A to the Long-Term Arrangement.

3. Furthermore, Denmark maintains import licensing of cotton textiles from the United Arab Republic, Colombia and the Republic of Korea, but - apart from the above-mentioned quota for cotton yarn - imports have so far not been restricted.

## NORWAY

- 2. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas which took place during the first, second</u> and third years of the Arrangement
  - (a) Japan

The quotas mentioned above have been increased by approximately 3 per cent each year according to the provisions in Article 2 of the Arrangement.

The following products have been liberalized:

1962: ex 55.05 Yarn for fishing purposes.

- <u>1963</u>: ex 55.09 Gauze for dressings with not more than 32 warp and weft threads per square centimeter and unbleached fabrics weighing 720 grams or more per square metre.

#### (b) South Korea

Until 1 October 1965 all imports from South Korea were regulated. From that date the same import arrangement is established for imports from this country as that formerly established for Japan.

3. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas envisaged during the remainder of the</u> <u>Arrangement</u>

Changes in restrictions for imports from Japan are agreed upon in the annual trade negotiations. The next trade negotiations will begin in November 1965.

#### SWEDEN

#### Quotas or import restrictions

# 1. <u>Restrictions and quotas effective as of 1 October 1965</u>

Japan is the only participating country towards which Sweden maintains import restrictions. These restrictions do not cover the entire cotton textile sector. The most important exceptions are grey cloth, gauze, handkerchiefs and pneumatic mattresses made of cotton and cotton yarn not put up for retail sale. For restricted cotton textiles Sweden at present maintains a quota of S.Kr.3.5 million (US\$0.7 million). The following BTN numbers are concerned: COT/58 Page 10

As a comparison to the above-mentioned figure - S.Nr.3.5 million - for the restricted import of cotton textiles from Japan, it can be mentioned that the total import of cotton textiles from that country in 1964 amounted to more than S.Kr.22 million.

## 2. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas which took place during the first, second</u> and third years of the Arrangement

When the Long-Term Arrangement Regarding Cotton Textiles entered into force, Japan was the only participating country towards which Sweden maintained import restrictions. The restrictions covered the entire textile sector, with certain exceptions. There was no special quota for cotton textiles.

Considering the provisions of the Long-Term Arrangement, the Governments of Sweden and Japan agreed during the first year of the Arrangement on a special quota for such cotton textiles which were subject to restrictions when imported into Sweden from Japan. The quota was fixed at C.Kr.3.5 million (about US\$0.7 million). One fifth of the total increase (one fifth of 15 per cent) undertaken by Sweden in accordance with Annex A of the Long-Term Arrangement was included in this figure.

During the second year of application of the Cotton Textile Arrangement a modification was introduced to the effect that goods - cotton gauze and carpets other than knitted - to an approximate value of S.Kr.0.5 million (US\$0.1 million) were exempted from restrictions without any corresponding lowering of the total value of the quota. Hereby considerably more scope was provided for imports of the remaining goods still restricted.

During the third year of the Arrangement no changes have taken place in the import restrictions on cotton textiles from Japan, as the negotiations which have been conducted on the trade relations between Sweden and Japan from 31 March 1965, when the earlier agreement expired, have so far not been concluded.

As illustrated by the above, Sweden has during the past three years more than fulfilled her undertakings under the Long-Term Arrangement.

## 5. <u>Changes in restrictions and guotas envisaged during the remainder of the</u> <u>Arrangement</u>

No indications of the future policy on import restrictions on cotton textiles can now be given apart from that Sweden intends to fulfil her obligations under the Long-Term Arrangement.

#### UNITED STATES

Quota or import restrictions referred to in Article 2

The United States maintains no restriction on imports of cotton textiles referrable to Article 2.

## EUROPEAN ECONOMIC COMMUNITY

1. The Commission of the European Economic Community has, on behalf of the member States of the Community, communicated the following:

- a list of tariff items on which liberalization measures were applied during the first year of application of the Long-Term Arrangement by member States which still maintained quantitative restrictions on these products - Table A;
- (ii) a list of items liberalized during the second year of application of the Arrangement Table B;
- (iii) a list of items liberalized during the third year of application of the Arrangement Table C;
- (iv) a statement of the quotas opened by the member States in 1962, 1963, 1964 and 1965 for imports of cotton textiles. To meet the wish expressed by several countries at the first meeting of the Cotton Textiles Committee this table indicates the quotas for each member State and for each exporting country - Table D.

2. As regards the fourth year of application of the Arrangement, the Community is not yet in a position to furnish information regarding quotas, for the amount of these will, in particular, be determined by bilateral negotiations which have yet to take place.
