ARRANGEMENT REGARDING INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN COTTON. TEXTILES

Notification under Article 2

Attached are notifications, in connexion with Article 2 of the Arrangement Regarding International Trade in Cotton Textiles, transmitted to the secretariat by the Governments of Australia, Austria, Denmark, Finland, Norway, Sweden, the United States and by the Commission of the European Communities in response to GATT/AIR/670 dated 22 August 1968.

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AUSTRALIA

Quota or Import Restrictions (Article 2)

Australia has no quantitative restrictions that are being applied contrary to the GATT in respect of cotton textiles.

(iii) <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas envisaged during the remainder</u> of the Arrangement

DENMARK

No changes have taken place or are envisaged in the quotas fixed in the bilateral arrangement between Denmark and Japan, which was notified to the GATT secretariat on 12 December 1963 (reproduced in document COT/25).

Denmark still maintains a quota for import of cotton yarn from the United Arab Republic. The quota, the size of which is based on the import of the said product from the United Arab Republic in 1962 (DKr 9.4 million), is increased yearly by 3 per cent in accordance with the provisions in Annex A of the Arrangement. For 1968 the quota amounts to DKr 12.5 million.

Furthermore Denmark maintains import licensing of cotton textiles from the United Arab Republic, Colombia, the Republic of Korea and the Republic of China.

A quota of DKr 0.7 million has been established in 1968 for imports of grey cloth from the Republic of Korea and a quota of DKr 0.4 million for imports of other cotton textiles from this country.

Apart from the above-mentioned quotas, imports from the said countries have in practice so far not been restricted.

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FINLAND

The global quotas and other import restrictions concerning cotton textiles and maintained for balance-of-payments reasons have been abolished on 1 January 1968.

NORWAY

Quota or Import Restrictions Referred to in Article 2

2. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas which took place during the five years of</u> the Avrangement and the first year of the extended Arrangement

(a) Japan

The quotas mentioned above have been increased by approximately 3 per cent each year according to the provisions in Article 2 of the Arrangement.

(b) South Korea

Until 1 October 1965, all imports from South Korea were regulated. From that date the same import arrangement is established for imports from this country as that formerly established for Japan.

In 1966, a quota for woven fabrics, which was set to \$14,000, was opened for imports from South Korea. The quota was in 1967 increased by 3 per cent according to the provisions of the Long-Term Arrangement.

When South Korea became a Member of the GATT, the Governments of South Korea and Norway agreed on an increase of the quota for woven fabrics. The quota for 1968 was fixed at \$100,000.

3. Changes in restrictions and quotas envisaged during the remainder of the Arrangement

Changes in restrictions for imports from Japan are agreed upon in the annual trade negotiations. Negotiations will take place in October 1968. As concerns the future policy on import restrictions on cotton textiles, Norway will fulfil her obligations under the Long-Term Arrangement.

SWEDEN

Quotas or Import Pestrictions Referred to in Article 2

1. Quotas effective as of 1 October 1968 for cotton textiles under restriction

Japan is the only participating country in the Cotton Textiles Arrangement towards which Sweden maintains import restrictions on cotton textiles. For restricted cotton textiles from Japan, Sweden at present maintains a quote of SKr 3.5 million (US\$0.7 million). The following BTN numbers are concerned:

2. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas which took place during the sixth year</u> of the Arrangement

No such changes have taken place.

3. <u>Changes in restrictions and quotas envisaged during the remainder of the</u> <u>Arrangement</u>

No indication of the future policy on import restrictions on cotton textiles can be given apart from that Sweden intends to fulfil her obligations under the Arrangement.

UNITED STATES

Quota on Import Restrictions Referred to in Article 2

The United States maintains no restrictions under Article 2.

EUROPEAN ECONOMIC COMMUNITY

The Commission of the European Communities has, on behalf of the member States of the Community, communicated the quotas of cotton textile products opened to exporting countries by member States in the years 1962 to 1968. The Commission also notified changes in the quotas envisaged during the remainder of the Arrangement.
