# GENERAL AGREEMENT ON TARIFFS AND TRADE

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## AUSTRALIAN TARIFF PREFERENCES FOR DEVELOPING COUNTRIES

Second Annual Report by the Gcvernment of Australic under the Decision of 28 March 1966

1. Pursuant to the Decision of the CONTRACTING PARTIES of 28 Narch 1966, Australia introduced e system of tariff preferences for developing countries on the manufactures, semi-manufactures and handicraft products listed in the anncx to thet Decision.
2. On 12 April 1966, provision for unlinited duty-free admission of the handicraft products concerned wes introduced. On the same day, importers were invited to apply for quota certificates for the importation, at preferential tariff rates, of products listed in the annox as being subject to quota control. The quota certificates were to be issued between 1 July and 31 December 1966, and wore to cover imports with total f.o.b. values not exceeding half the level of oech amual queta provided for in the waiver. Importers to whom certificates were issued were permitted to import the products concerned at eny time within twelve months from 1 July 1966.
3. On 19 Septamber 1966, applications were invited for quota certificates to be issued during the second holf of the first qucta year for preferential imports up to the value of the remaining half of each annual quota provided for in the annex, plus any unallocated portion of the quota made available during the first halif of the quota yeer. Importers to whom allocations were made were permitted to inport the products concerned at any time within twclve zonths fron I Jenuary 1967.
4. In the same way, invitations have been extended to inporters bofore the beginning of cach subscquont holf year. In cach case, however, account has been taken of increases in the scope of the syster which heve been mede effective upon completion of the notification and consultation procudures laid down in the Docision. The relevant notifications are those which were circulated in docunonts $\mathrm{L} / 2793$ of 19 May 1967; I/2793/Add. 1 of 15 Junc 1967; I/2832 of 7 August 1967; L/2922 of 22 November 1967; L/2971 of 2 February 1968; L/2974 of 14 Fcbruary 1968; L/2982 of 26 Februnry 1968; L/3038 of 5 July 1968; and L/3061 of 28 August 1968. Apart from reductions in some of the proforential rates of duty and increases in the product coverage of many of the quotas, the total value of the quetas available has been progressivoly increased until, at the present time, it stands at approximetcly $\$ 26.6$ million per annuin - or double the initial totel of approxinntely $\$ 13.3$ millicn per annum. Additionally, the number of typos of handicraft product adinissible at the preferentiol duty-frec rate has buen increased considerably. In all ceses, the goods concerned have been nominated by devoloping countries as boing of export intcrest to thern.

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5. All cllocations of qucte aro ando without discrinination between applicant inporters or eligible countrics of crigin.
6. Paragrephs 4 and 5 of the Decision of the CONTRACTING PARTIES provides for consultations with any contracting party which considers that action taken or proposed by Australia under the Decision is causing or threatens substantiol injury to its trade with Australia in the relevant goods. The only such requests which have so far been received heve been two from the United Kingdon on behalf of Hong Kong. In cach case, the request concerned the exclusion of Hong Kong from particular preforonces. In both cases, the consultations werc satisfactorily concluded and contracting parties were advised of the outcome in documents $\mathrm{L} / 2832$ and $\mathrm{L} / 2971$.
7. Annexed to this report are tables of statistics on the allocation of preferential quotes and on import clearances, Iroin all sources, of products of the type to which the prefercntial quotas apply. The tables cover the two-year period 1966/67 to 1967/68. In the casc of import clearances, figures for 1965/66 arc included for purposes oi comparisen.
8. Anncx A shows the total value of allocations mede during each of the sixmonthly poriods involved, in rospect of cach of the product quotas in force at the time. Anncy $B$ shows the totel ailocations for ench of the developing countrics nominated by applicant inportors es the intended scurce of supply. Annex $C$ shows the f.o.b. value of imports actually cleared under the tariff itcon(s) to which cach queta applied. Annox $D$ shows the total sourcing of those inports, andi of preferenticl duty-free impcrts of handicraft products, fron particular developing ccuntries.
9. In the column honded "Qucts. Group" in Annoxes A and C, the teriff iton shown in oach cesc is eithor the itan to which a separate queta applics or, if nore than one item shares a single quata, the first of the group of items shoring the quota. The figuros which appoar epposite each oi the tariff itons shown, however, represent the totals of the allocetions of cloaronces rppliceble to the iten or itoms to which each qucta applios.
10. The statistics relatc only to the proferences which wore in operation prior to 1 July 1968. They do not include, for instance, the products added to the syston with oficet from 1 July 1968, in accordenec with the announcoment of Australie's Minister for Trade and Industry at the Scend United Nations Conforence on Trade and Developmont ( $L / 2974$ ).
11. It will be scon that for the poriod covered by the statistics, both quets allocations and import clearances at the special proforentiol rates availeble havo been inerensing rapidly. It is also ovident, however, that there ronains considerable scope for developing countrics to taice greator adventage of the opportunitios provided by the systern.
12. As stated in the last annual report on the operation of the system, all requests for the inclusion of further products within the system have been or are being carefuily considered and it remains the intention of the Australian Goverment to seek to further assist developing countries by improving the operation and progressively widening the scope of the system.
