## RESTRICTIONS ON IMPORTS FROM POLAND

## Notifications by Contracting Parties

1. Contracting parties were invited in airgrain GATT/ATR/718 of 13 May 1969 to notify, pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 3 of the Protocol for the Accession of Poland and in preparation for the second annual review under the Protocol:
(a) prohibitions or quantitative restrictions maintained on 30 June 1967 on imports from Poland, and
(b) action taken or envisaged under paragraph $3(a)$ of the Protocol towards removing such restrictions and the results of-sueh aetions.
2. Notifications have been received from the following Governments:

These notifications are reproduced hereunder.
3. Contracting parties, which have not yet sumitied nctifications, are invited to do so without delay. It was indicated in GATT/AIR/718 that governments which had already notified their restrictions in comesion with the first review under the Protocol, as restrictions applied contrary to GATT or as restrictions maintained for balance-of-payments reasons, would only be required to refer to their previous notifications, to the extent that these fulfilled the particular requirements laid down in GATI/AIR/728.

## AUSTRALTA

(a) Please refer to the letter of 15 May 1959 concerning the Australian notification of import restrictions contrary to GATT (I/ $3212 /$ Add:I). Australia does not maintain any import restrictions on Polish goods contrary to Article XIII.
(b) Not applicable to Australia as this sub-paragraph refers only to restrictions contrary to Article XIII.

## CZECHOSLDVAKIA

As was notified in connexion with the first annuel review, Gzechoslovakia does not maintain any discriminatory restrictions on imports from Poland.

## DENMARK

The increase by 25 per cent of the quotas for the commodities not subject to free licensing mentioned in the last notification reproduced in Annex $V$ to document I/3093 1 , has in certain cases proved to be sufficient in relation to the marketing possibilities existing in Denmark. The abolition of these formal restrictions is therefore now being considered by the Danish Government.

The quotas for comodities involving mariset disruption risks have, as a result of bilateral negotiations in the spring this year, been increased by 7 por cent. At the same time quotas have been established for cormodities not proviously imported froin Poland.

Trade between Denmark and Poland has developed as follows:

As can be seen, Poland's exports to Deninark are increasing feirly rapidly. The Danish deficit will be reduced substantially in the coning years due to deliveries of ships to Poland.

## FITUAND

The Permanent Mission of Finland presents its compliments to the secretariat of GETT and, with reference to GATT/riIR/718, has the honour to enclose herewith a list showing the Finnish inporis in 1967 and 1968 from Poland in headings completely liborated from licensing and a list showing the inports from Poland in 1967 and 1968 in headings wholly or partly subject to licensine.

In the opinior of the Finnish authorities this information corresponds best to the material requestod under paragraph (B) of GATT/AIB/718.

Sixteenth Suphlement, page 6o, paragraph 11) and the. notification of resicual tinport restrictions apmied by Ireiand, contained in document $\mathrm{L} / 298 \mathrm{I} / \mathrm{Ada} .1$ of 5 ivaren $196 \mathrm{~B}^{\circ}$.

## JAFEN

The Permancnt Delegation of Japan to the International Organizations in Geneva presents its compliments to tine secretariat o $0 \stackrel{1}{c}$ the GiTT and has the honour to notify, with regard to the GATI/AIR/718, that the Government of Japan has no discriminatory import restrictions against Poland.

## MLDAGASGAR

I have the honour to irform you that the regulations in force in Madagascar do not contain any restrictive measure directed particularly to imports from Poland; the restrictive measures applying to imporis involve ne discrimination.

## MALTA

Imports from Poland are treated in the same way as imports from other GATT member countries except that a licence is required for all imports from countries of the "Fastern bloc". Licences, however, are freely issued except for those products which are restric jed on importation from any country. A list of restrictions in force on 30 June 1967 is contained in document I/2749/Add. 3.

## NORWAY

Referring to GATr/AIR/718, I have the honour to enclose the list of items in the Norwegian Customs larlff suoject to restrictions when inported from Poland.

In response to point (3) in the above-mentioned airgram, I should like to recall what was stated in our last notification that my Govermment has for a number of years pursued on an autonomous basis a liberal policy with regard to imports from Poland.

## SOUTH AFRICA

I have the honour to refer to GATT/AIR/718 of 13 May 1969, and to inform you that South Africa's import restrictions, as is stated in paragraph 3 of document BOP/87 of 14 October 1968, do not discriminate among countries from which goods are imported. South Africa does not discriminate against Poland in the administration of its quantitative impori restrictions.

Since I October 1965, when a large number of products imported from Poland were liberalized, only a few products are subject to import restrictions. On 30 June 1967 the quotas mentioned below were applied for Swedish imports from Poland. With effect from I January 1968 respectively 1 January 1969 certain of these quotas have been increased. Most of these quotas have not been fully utilized.
