The subsidies to reduce fruit prices for needy persons and for the mountain population amounted on the avorage to 23 cantimes per ke.

As regards the utilization of dessert fruit surpluses, subsidies were paid in particular for apricots and totalled Sw F 1.94 million. They amounted on average to 17 centimes per kg.

The subsidies per unit in respect of the other measures mentioned cannot be indicated because their amount varies too much with conditiions and the market situation.
