Dear Mr. Chairman:

This responds to your letter requesting information, pursuant to Article 11 of the MFA, on restrictions maintained on trade in textiles by the Government of the United States.

As of July 1984, the United States had negotiated or was maintaining bilateral agreements containing restraints on one or more products with 28 countries; had established additional restraints /1 during 1983 and 1984 with 18 of these countries pursuant to the consultation provisions of the agreements or Article 3 of the MFA; and was maintaining unilateral restraints on one or more products with five countries (the Dominican Republic, Panama, Peru, Spain, and Turkey).

All restraints have been or will shortly be notified to the TSB. Attached is a table outlining the status of the various agreements as of July 31, 1984. The more detailed information necessary to update the tables for the TSB's 1984 report is being provided separately.
