# ARRANGEMENT REGARDING INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN TEXTILES

# Notification under Article 4:4

Amendment of the Bilateral Agreement between Canada and Malaysia

The Textiles Surveillance Body has received a notification from Canada of a further amendment to its bilateral agreement with Malaysia, concluded under Article 4 of the MFA. The parties agreed to restraints on T-shirts and sweatshirts, and on men's and boys', children's and infants' shirts (other than tailored-collar).

The TSB, pursuant to its procedures regarding bilateral agreements notified under Article 4<sup>2</sup>, has examined the relevant documentation and is forwarding the text of the notification to participating countries for their information.

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#### CANADA/MALAYSIA TEXTILE CONSULTATIONS

### AGREED RECORD OF DISCUSSIONS

1. Delegations representing the Government of Canada and the Government of Malaysia met in Kuala Lumpur on 16-18 August 1984 to consider Canada's request for consultations regarding exports from Malaysia of T-shirts and sweatshirts to Canada in accordance with the provisions of Article 4 of the Arrangement Regarding International Trade in Textiles.

2. During the discussions, the two delegations agreed that the Malaysian authorities will begin to restrain, effective 1 September 1984 through to 31 December 1986, exports from Malaysia to Canada of T-shirts and sweatshirts through the issuance of "Export Licences" as described in the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Government of Canada and the Government of Malaysia relating to the export from Malaysia of certain textiles and textile products for import into Canada and, in the Agreed Record of Discussions signed in Kuala Lumpur on 16 March 1984. It was further agreed that in accordance with the above-mentioned Agreed Record of Discussions, T-shirts and sweatshirts are classified as Item No.9.

3. It was agreed that during the period 1 September to 31 December 1984 exports of T-shirts and sweatchirts from Malaysia to Canada shall be subject to a restraint level of 350,000 units and that on a one-time only basis, an additional 500,000 units will be made available ex-quota for 1984 shipments of T-shirts and sweatshirts covered by irrevocable letters of credit. It was also agreed that, for the period 1 September to 31 December 1984 only, special carry forward will be allowed of up to 25 per cent of the 1985 restraint level and, if required, an additional carry forward of up to 25 per cent of the 1986 restraint level will be allowed provided that the full 1985 special carry forward provision is exercised. The conversion factor for T-shirts and sweatshirts will be 1.2 square metres per unit.

4. It was agreed that the restraint level for 1985 is 1,113,000 units and that the restraint level for 1986 will be accorded a further 6 per cent growth factor yielding a level of 1,179,780 units. The provision for swing will be 7 per cent and the provision for carryover/carry forward will be 11(6) per cent, of which carry forward will not be more than 6 per cent. The combined use of swing, carryover and carry forward will not exceed 15 per cent.

5. The two sides agreed to restrain Malaysia's exports to Canada of shirts for men's, boys', children's and infants', other than with tailored-collars. It was further agreed that Item No.2 of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) will be revised to include the description of Item No.8 of the Agreed Record and that the 1984 restraint level of the revised Item No.2 is 944,000 units. Existing growth and flexibility provisions for Item No.2 will remain in effect and the conversion factor shall be 1.6 square metres per unit. 6. The provisions of paragraphs 2 to 5 of this Agreed Record of Discussions will become effective 1 September 1984 subsequent to an exchange of notes between the two governments confirming their acceptance of these provisions.
