## ARRANGEMENT REGARDING INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN TEXTILES

## Notification under Article 4

## Modification of the bilateral agreement between the United States and Hong Kong

The Textiles Surveillance Body received a notification from the United States of an amendment of its agreement with Hong Kong resulting from changes in the United States' category system related to the adoption of the Harmonized Commodity Code by the United States.

The TSB, pursuant to its procedures regarding notifications made under Article 4, has examined the relevant documentation, and is forwarding the text of the notification to participating countries for their information.

### UNITED STATES AND HONG KONG AMEND BILATERAL TEXTILE AGREEMENT

The United States and Hong Kong exchanged letters on March 2, 1988 and March 7, 1988 to amend their Bilateral Textile Agreement. Text of the letters follow:

Dear Ms. Lee:

I have the honor to refer to the Arrangement Regarding International Trade in Textiles, done at Geneva on December 20, 1973, as extended, and to the Agreement on Trade in Cotton, Wool, Man-Made Fiber, Silk-Blend and Non-cotton Vegetable Fiber Textiles and Textile Products between the Government of Hong Kong and the Government of the United States of America dated August, 4, 1986, as amended (the Agreement). I also refer to consultations held in Washington from 29 June to 2 July, from 28 to 29 July, and from 14 to 17 September 1987, in Geneva from 19 to 21 October 1987, and in Hong Kong from 14 to 15 November 1987. The consultations referred to the effects on the Agreement of changes in the United States category system for textiles and textile products related to the adoption of the Harmonized Commodity Code by the United States. I further refer to the Memorandum of Understanding signed in Washington on December 9, 1987.

On behalf of my Government and in accordance with the above mentioned Memorandum of Understanding, I propose the following amendments to the Agreement:

- I. Paragraph 3(a), (b) and (c) of the Agreement shall be amended to read as follows:
  - "3. Textiles and textile products covered by this Agreement are as follows:

- (a) Group I being products other than apparel (including yarn, fabric, and other made-up and miscellaneous products) of cotton, wool and/or man-made fiber (Categories 200, 201, 218, 219, 220, 222, 223, 224, 225, 226, 227, 229, 300, 301, 313, 314, 315, 317, 326, 360, 361, 362, 363, 369, 400, 410, 414, 464, 465, 469, 600, 603, 604, 606, 607, 611, 613, 614, 615, 617, 618, 619, 620, 621, 622, 624, 625, 626, 627, 628, 629, 665, 666, 669, 670).
- (b) Group II being apparel of cotton, wool, and/or man-made fiber (Categories 239, 330, 331, 332, 333, 334, 335, 336, 337, 338, 339, 340, 341, 342, 345, 347, 348, 349, 350, 351, 352, 353, 354, 359, 431, 432, 433, 434, 435, 436; 438, 439, 440, 442, 443, 444, 445, 446, 447, 448, 459, 630, 631, 632, 633, 634, 635, 636, 637, 638, 639, 640, 641, 642, 643, 644, 645, 646, 647, 648, 649, 650, 651, 652, 653, 654, 659, 443/444/643/644/843/844(1) to cover men's, boys', women's and girls' made-to-measure suits of wool, man-made fiber, silk-blend and non-cotton vegetable fibers).
- (c) Group III being apparel, other than sweaters, of silk blend and/or non-cotton vegetable fiber (Categories 831, 832, 833, 834, 835, 836, 838, 839, 840, 842, 843, 844, 847, 850, 851, 852, 858, 859)."
- II. Paragraph 5 of the Agreement shall be amended as follows:
  - "(i) to amend paragraph 5(d) to read as follows:
    - (d) For the purposes of (a), (b) and (c) preceding, calculations shall be in square meters equivalent on the basis of the conversion factors set out in Annex B and, in the case of merged categories, as set out in paragraph 9. As regards merged Category 633/634/635, the conversion factor of the affected Sub-Limit or Sub-Limits will apply.
  - (ii) to add paragraph 5(e):
    - (e) In addition to provision (c) preceding, as from 1988:
      - (i) The Specified Limit of Category 648 set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof) may, during any agreement year, be exceeded by not more than 7 percent of which any swing in excess of 5 percent set out in Annex C must originate from Category 647;
      - (ii) The Specified Limits of Categories 443, 444 and 644 set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof) may be exceeded during any agreement year up to the levels (dozens) specified below:

with transfer-in, on an upper-cum-lower garment basis, from the relevant component garment categories specified as follows:

In the event of any transfer into Categories 444 and 644 from their component garment categories, the Group II Limit of the agreement year in which the transfer is effected will be adjusted downwards to take account of such transfer and the difference in their respective conversion factors.

## (iii) to add paragraph 5(f):

(f) For the 1988 agreement year only, in addition to the provisions (c) and (e), the Specified Limits of the following categories set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof) may be exceeded by an additional one percent:

The additional swing can only be utilized with yardage from categories of like products in Group II. Hong Kong shall decide prior to 1989 whether any yardage thus swung in 1988 should be permanently transferred. This swing provision would thereafter no longer apply.

## (iv) to add paragraph 5(g):

(g) In addition to provision (a), the Group III Limit set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof) may be exceeded during any agreement year with transfer in, on a temporary basis, from Group II up to the levels (square meters equivalent) indicated below:

## (v) to add paragraph 5(h):

(h) Notwithstanding provision (c), the Specified Limits of Categories 835, 836, 840 and 846(1) set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof) may be exceeded during any agreement year up to the levels (dozens) specified below:

## (vi) to add paragraph 5(i):

(i) Notwithstanding provision (c), the 1988 Specified Limit of Category 845(1) set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof) may be exceeded by transfer from Category 345 in an amount not exceeding 28,298 dozens. Hong Kong shall decide towards 1989 whether any of the yardage transferred should be made permanent as from 1989."

### III. Paragraph 8 of the Agreement shall be amended to read as follows:

- "8. (a) Tops, yarns, piece goods, made-up articles, garments and other textile manufactured products, all being products which derive their chief characteristics from their textile components of cotton, wool, man-made fiber, silk, non-cotton vegetable fibers, or blends thereof, in which any or all of those fibers in combination represent the chief weight of the product, are subject to this Agreement.
  - (b) For the purposes of this Agreement, textile products covered by sub-paragraph (a) above shall be classified as:
    - (i) Man-made fiber textiles, if the product is in chief weight of man-made fibers, unless:
      - (A) the product is knitted or crocheted apparel in which wool equals or exceeds 23 percent by weight of all fibers, in which case the product will be a wool textile; or
      - (B) the product is apparel, not knitted or crocheted, in which wool equals or exceeds 36 percent by weight of all fibers, in which case the product will be a wool textile;
      - (C) the product is a woven fabric in which wool equals or exceeds 36 percent by weight of all fibers, in which case the product will be a wool textile.

- (ii) Cotton textiles, if not covered by (i) and if the product is in chief weight of cotton, unless the product is a woven fabric in which wool equals or exceeds 36 percent by weight of all fibers, in which case the product will be a wool textile.
- (iii) Wool textiles, if neither of the foregoing applies, and the product is in chief weight of wool.
- (iv) Silk blend or non-cotton vegetable fiber textiles, if none of the foregoing applies and the product is in chief weight of silk or non-cotton vegetable fiber, unless:
  - (A) cotton with wool and/or man-made fibers in the aggregate equal or exceed 50 percent by weight of the component fibers thereof and the cotton component equals or exceeds the weight of each of the total wool and/or man-made fiber components, in which case the product will be a cotton textile.
  - (B) if not covered by (iv) (A) and wool exceeds 17 percent by weight of all component fibers, in which case the product will be considered a wool textile.
  - (C) if not covered by (iv) (A) or (B) and man-made fibers in combination with cotton and/or wool in the aggregate equal or exceed 50 percent by weight of the component fibers thereof and the man-made fiber component exceeds the weight of the total wool and/or total cotton component, in which case the product will be considered a man-made fiber textile.
- (c) Notwithstanding the above, garments which contain 70 percent or more by weight silk (unless they also contain over 17 percent by weight wool), and products other than garments which contain 85 percent or more by weight silk, are not subject to this Agreement. Silk blend and non-cotton vegetable fiber sweaters, as determined above, shall be divided into "silk blend" sweaters and "non-cotton vegetable fiber" sweaters. For the purpose of this division, sweaters shall be

classified as "silk blend" if the silk component exceeds by weight the non-cotton vegetable fiber component (if any). Sweaters not classified as "silk blend" sweaters in accordance with the foregoing shall be classified as "non-cotton vegetable fiber" sweaters. Garments containing 70 percent or more by weight silk and over 17 percent by weight wool shall be classified as wool textiles, under subparagraph (b) (iv) (B).

- (d) For textile products covered by this Agreement but for which a chief weight determination cannot be made pursuant to subparagraph (b) above because two or more fibers are of equal weight, then products with wool as one of the fibers of equal weight shall be classified in accordance with the provisions for wool determination for the respective products specified in subparagraph (b) above, and products not classified as wool textiles in accordance with the foregoing shall be classified as non-cotton vegetable fiber, silk, man-made fiber, cotton and wool in that order of preference.
- (e) Coverage under this paragraph is intended to be identical with the terms of Article 12 of the Arrangement Regarding International Trade in Textiles and in conformance with paragraph 24 of the July 31, 1986, Protocol of Extension. In the event of a question regarding whether a product is covered by this Agreement by virtue of being in chief weight of cotton, wool, man-made fiber, silk, or non-cotton vegetable fiber, the chief value of the fibers may be considered."
- IV. Paragraph 9(a) and (b) of the Agreement shall be amended
   as follows:
  - "9. (a) The system of categories and the rates of conversion into square meters equivalent listed in Annex B hereto shall apply in implementing this Agreement, except as provided for in paragraph 9 hereof.
    - (b) For the purposes of this Agreement and with reference to the particular circumstances of Hong Kong's trade patterns with the United States of America, the categories below are merged as

indicated and treated as single categories, with limits for categories and sub-categories as set out in Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof).

For the purposes of paragraph 5, the conversion factors for individual categories set out in Annex B shall be applied, except that for Categories 333 and 334 the conversion factor shall be 33.0 square meters equivalent per dozen, for Categories 633 and 634 the conversion factor shall be 33.9 square meters equivalent per dozen, and for Categories 638 and 639 the conversion factor shall be 13.0 square meters equivalent per dozen."

V. Annex A (or pursuant to any amendment thereof), Annex B and Annex C of the Agreement shall be amended and replaced by the relevant Annexes A to C attached to this letter.

These amendments shall be retroactive to January 1, 1988, with the understanding that the above arrangements may have to be reviewed in the light of both Governments' experience with the new textile category system. Any such review will be undertaken through consultations with a view to ensuring that Hong Kong's access rights, entitlements and flexibility arrangements under the Agreement will be fully preserved.

It is further understood that the special licensing arrangements implemented by Hong Kong because the legislation for the adoption of the Harmonized Commodity Code was not passed by the United States Congress before January 1, 1988, are set out in Appendix I to this letter.

If the foregoing is acceptable to your Government, this letter and the letter of acceptance on behalf of your Government shall constitute an amendment to the Agreement.

#### APPENDIX I

## Special Licensing Arrangement Implemented by Hong Kong

(Effective from January 1, 1988 until such time as legislation adopting the Harmonized Commodity Code is passed by the United States Congress.)

- 1. It is understood that until the Harmonized Commodity Code is passed by the U.S. Congress and the new Harmonized Commodity Code tariffs are implemented, the United States will not implement some of the new arrangements under the new textile and apparel category system. These include:
  - (a) new arrangements on suits;
  - (b) new arrangements on infants' wear (excluding cotton and man-made fiber infants sets);
  - (c) new Category 611; and
  - (d) chief weight criterion for classification purposes.

Moreover, the United States will not implement the metric system until the Harmonized Commodity Code tariffs are adopted. It is understood that for export control purposes, Hong Kong has to implement the new arrangements as from January 1, 1988. Due to implications on quota commitments, it is not possible to switch from the previous arrangements to the new arrangements in the middle of the textile agreement year.

# Contingency Arrangements with Respect to Suits, Infants' wear, Category 611 and Chief Weight Criterion

- 2. Hong Kong will implement the following arrangements as from January 1, 1988 and until such time as legislative authority for the Harmonized Commodity Code is obtained:
  - (a) Hong Kong will implement the new category system as from January 1, 1988, for export control purposes:
  - (b) For the affected categories, exporters will submit two sets of EL applications with respect to each consignment: one with the proper classification under the new arrangement (EL-A) and another with the classification under the old arrangement (EL-B). For the purpose of export control in Hong Kong, EL-A with the new classification will be used. Hong Kong's

shipment return will also show the quantity licensed under the new arrangements. On the other hand, Hong Kong will issue the visa copy of EL-B only to the Hong Kong exporter for sending over to the United States importer for customs clearance purposes. No visa copy of EL-A will be issued.

(c) Hong Kong will provide the United States Department of Commerce at the end of each month a monthly return on the actual licensed quantities in the categories concerned according to the new category system. The monthly return will have details of visa numbers and for each visa number the category and quantity licensed. The United States Department of Commerce will debit the respective restraint limits according to the monthly returns supplied by Hong Kong.

## Contingency Arrangements in respect of Metrication

- 3. For textile export control purposes, Hong Kong will convert to metric as from January 1, 1988. Quota units in imperial units will also be shown on all export licenses. However, for data reconciliation and quota accounting purposes between Hong Kong and the United States, only the data/statistics recorded in metric units will be used.
- 4. For classification purposes, the following arrangements will apply:
  - (a) Sweaters:

As from January 1, 1988, Hong Kong will introduce the "nine stitches per two centimeters" criteria. Exporters will be required to declare the stitch counts in both metric and imperial units to facilitate customs clearance.

#### (b) Yarns and Fabrics:

Hong Kong will classify yarns and fabrics in 1988 according to the classification criteria in metric units, i.e., grams per square meter, total number of warp and filling yarns per square centimeter, etc. The average yarn number will accordingly be calculated under the metric system. To avoid confusion, export licenses issued from January 1, 1988, onwards will only indicate the description of the yarns/fabrics set out in metric units.

## Possible Hold-ups

5. In view of the significant changes in classification under the new category system, it is envisaged that there will be hold-ups. Both the United States and Hong Kong undertake to deal with held-up cases expeditiously. While the established waiver arrangement will be used to clear held-up shipments, to avoid further confusion and delay the United States Customs will give clear reasons for any hold-up. It is also agreed that the subject of hold-ups will be included in the mid-1988 review.

Thank you for your letter of 2 March 1988 proposing certain amendments to the Hong Kong/US Bilateral Textiles Agreement of 4 August 1986 (as amended) pursuant to the consultations held in Washington from 29 June to 2 July, from 28 to 29 July, and from 14 to 17 September 1987, in Geneva from 19 to 21 October 1987, and in Hong Kong from 14 to 15 November 1987 between the Government of the United States and the Government of Hong Kong on the effects on the Agreement of changes in the United States category system for textiles and textile products related to the adoption of the Harmonized Commodity Code by the United States.

On behalf of the Government of Hong Kong, I have the honour to accept the amendments as proposed by the Government of the United States.

I confirm that these amendments are retroactive to 1 January 1988, with the understanding that the above arrangements may have to be reviewed in the light of both Governments' experience with the new textile category system. Any such review will be undertaken through consultations with a view to ensuring that Hong Kong's access rights, entitlements and flexibility arrangements under the Agreement will be fully preserved.

I further confirm that pending adoption of the Harmonized Commodity Code by the United States, special licensing arrangements have been instituted by my Government in respect of certain shipments as set out in Appendix I to your letter under reference.
