## LIST OF OFFERS

Presented by India

At the request of the Indien Delegation, the secretariat transmits herewith to members of the Trade Negotiations Committee a list of products in respect of which the Indian Government is in a position to consider offering concessions in the context of the trade negotiations among developing countries.

French and Spanish versions of the note accompanying the list of products will be circulated shortly.

Subject: Trade Nerotiations among Developinp Countries.
The Delegation of India has exchanged request lists with a number of developing countries who are parificipatine in the Trade Negotiations among Developing Countries. Several participating countries havo also addressed specific request lists to India. Some other participants have suomitted generel request lists.
2. Having regerd to the multilateral character of these negotistions, the Delegation of India has, apart from the specific and general requests addressed to India, also examined generally the products in respect of which requests fur concessions have been made by one or more participating countries in these negotiations (reference GATT document INT(69)179/Rev.I of 14th October 1969). The Delegation of India wishes to indicate the products in reapect of which it is in a position to consider offering concessions in customs duty on a preferential basis and in accordanco with the Working Rules adopted by the Trade Negotiatione Committee of Developing Countries. A list of such products is annexed.
3. In respect of item included in the Annex., the Delegation of India will consider, on a basis of mutual benefit, offering special tariff concessions equivalent to $50 \%$ or the effective Most Favoured-Nation rates of customs duty: The Delegation of India will also be ready to consider, on a case by case basis, requests for tariff concessions which are not included in tho Annex. 4. The Delegation of India hopes that in the light of the indications given in this commuication, it will be possible for the delegations of other participating countries to respond to India's requests for concessions and further consultations/negotiations can be held with a vies to early and satisfactory completion of these negotiations.
