- Speciality metals, defined as steels melted in steelmanufacturing facilities located in the United States or its possessions, where the maximum alloy content exceeds one or more of the following limits, must be used in products purchased by DOD: (1) manganese, 1.65 per cent; silicon, 0.60 per cent; or copper, 0.06 per cent; or which contains more than 0.25 per cent of any of the following elements: aluminium, chromium, cobalt, columbium, olybdenum, nickel, titanium, tungsten, or vanadium; (2) metal alloys consisting of nickel, iron-nickel and cobalt base alloys containing a total of other alloying metals (except iron) in excess of 10 per cent; (3) titanium and titanium alloys; or (4) zirconium base alloys;

# Government Entities Exercising Influence Over Non-Governmental Entities

#### General Notes

- 1. Notwithstanding the above, this Agreement will not apply to set asides on behalf of and minority businesses.
- 2. Procurement in terms of U.S. coverage is defined as contractual transactions to acquire property or services for the direct benefit or use of the government. It does not include non-contractual agreements or any form of government assistance, including, but not limited to, cooperative agreements, grants, loans, equity infusions, guarantees, fiscal incentives, and governmental provision of goods and services, given to individuals, firms, private institutions, and subcentral governments. 2
