

Annecey, 16th July 1949.

Sir,

The Norwegian and Canadian Delegations at Annecey have had some discussions with a view to a modification of the Note which appears under Tariff Item No. 412 in Part I of Geneva Schedule XIV, a concession originally allocated to Canada. These discussions were linked to the Norway-United Kingdom negotiations at Annecey.

The Norwegian and Canadian Delegations have agreed on the following rewording of the Note mentioned above, representing a further concession. They have also agreed to the inclusion of this Tariff Item and Note in the Annecey Schedule XIV to be annexed to the Annecey Protocol of Terms of Accession. The further concession represented by this Tariff Item and Note is also allocated to Canada.

423 wheat Free

NOTE: Provided that for each calendar quarter the selling price of wheat shall not include for protection of the Norwegian grain production more than 25 per cent of the average landed cost of wheat of comparable kind and quality imported in the previous quarter; provided, however, that the domestic selling price per 100 kilos shall not be required to be reduced in any six months' period by more than 15 per cent or 3.1/2 kroner whichever is the less."

Tariff Item No. 423 and the new accompanying Note will enter into force on the day on which the Annex Schedule XIV enters into force. On that day Tariff Item 412 and the Note now appearing in the Geneva Schedule XIV will cease to have effect.

The renumbering of the Tariff Item on wheat from 412 to 423 results from a change in the numbering of items in the Norwegian Customs Tariff.
