POINT 1: SIGNIFICANCE OF PROCUREMENT MARKETS

Government procurement represents in Switzerland

36 billions of Swiss francs = 25 % of government expenses undertaken by the respective levels of State as follows:

Confederation: 19 %,

• Cantons: 38 %,

Municipalities: 43 %.

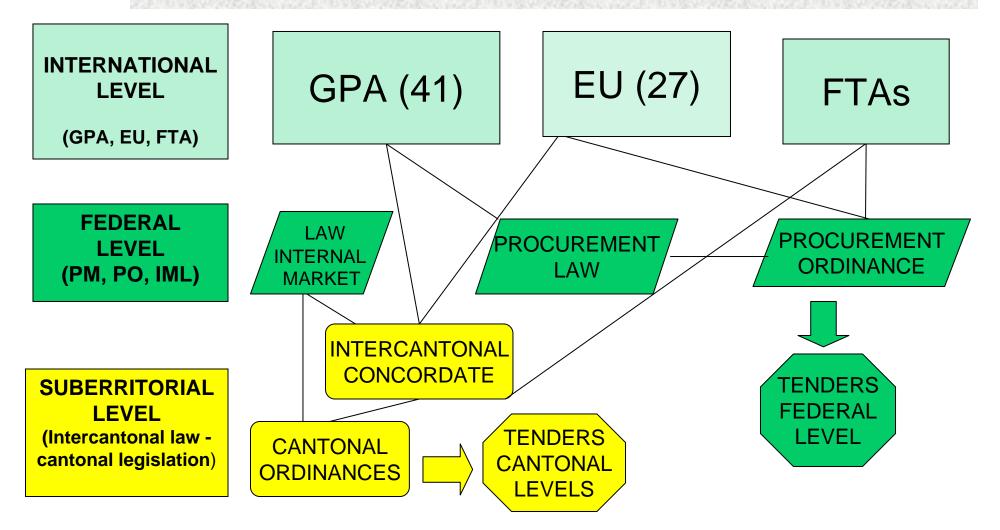

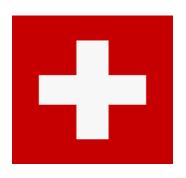

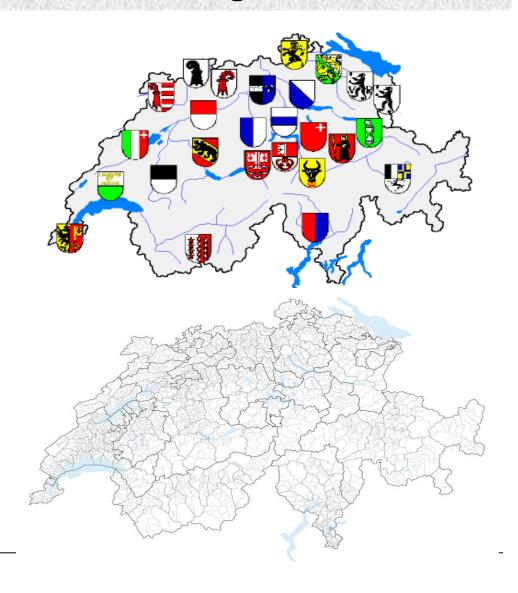

- 26 cantons
- 3000 municipalities





POINT 4: Legal aspects of the implementation at subterritorial level: The Intercantonal Agreement

The 26 Swiss cantons operate since November 25, 1994 under the **Intercantonal Agreement on government procurement**, revised on March 15, 2001 and its Executive Directives. All cantons have joined the revised Agreement also named "concordate".

The <u>objective</u> of the concordate - defined in its Article 1 – is to implement the commitments under international treaties (GPA, bilateral and FTA) at subterritorial levels (cantons, municipalities, utilities, etc.).

The realization of this objective leads to provisional conclusions as follows:

- The cantons <u>comply</u> with the commitments of the international treaties
- They use a <u>parallel implementation</u> to the federal level (law/ordinance)
- The international treaties <u>fully apply at federal and subterritorial levels</u>



POINT 4: Legal aspects of the implementation at subterritorial level: Legal outcomes of the Concordate

The subterritorial legislation on <u>government</u> procurement generates the following outcomes at the levels of cantons and municipalities:

- a)transparency of the tendering procedure and awarding of contracts;
- b)strengthening of competition between tenderers;
- c)Access to the markets to foreign bidders on a reciprocal basis;
- d)equal treatment between tenderers as requested by the GPA;
- e) Implementation of internationally agreed mandatory thresholds
- f) rational use of public funds through competition;
- g)respect of the provisions referring to <u>workers' safety</u> and <u>working</u> <u>conditions</u> for procurement in Switzerland;
- h)wide access of tender notices through paper and electronic means;
- i) efficient remedy system at cantonal levels.



POINT 4: Legal aspects of the implementation at subterritorial level: Differences between cantonal and federal levels

<u>Differences between cantonal and the federal levels include</u>:

- •the cantons do not foresee the option to negotiate during a tender process;
- •The cantons cover <u>all services</u> and are therefore an appropriate model for GPA-members to address the issue of market access based on reciprocity.

<u>Differences cleared between the cantonal and federal levels include</u>:

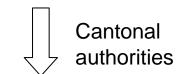

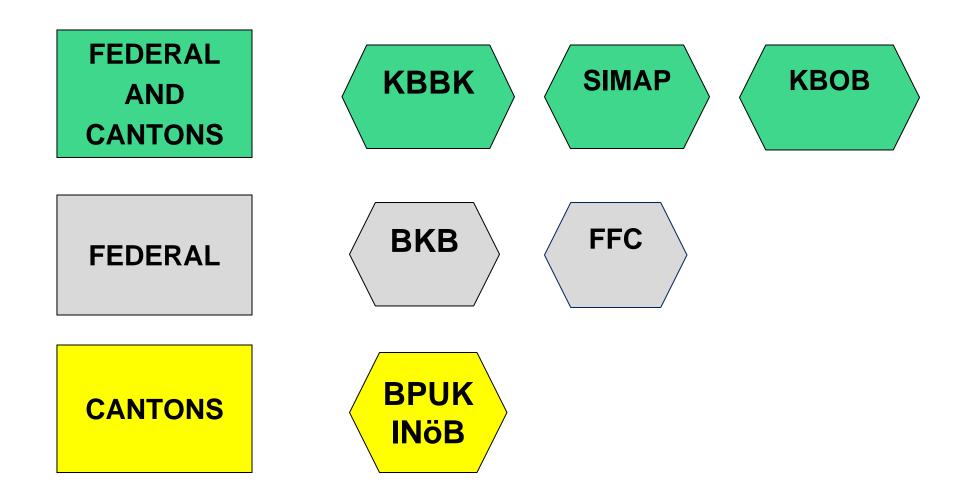

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POINT 5 : INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK Cantonal level

The Swiss Conference of the cantonal directors for publics works, land management and environmental protection (BPUK) is the inter-cantonal authority in charge of government procurement. This Authority has the competence to modify the Inter-cantonal Agreement, edict rules on tender procedures, modify thresholds below the internationally agreed thresholds, check the implementation of the inter-cantonal Agreement and adopt rules of procedures and organisation.

The BPUK has elaborated <u>executive directives</u> and <u>recommendations</u>. The BPUK is also an information and advice organ to the cantons. In each canton, the department or the unit in charge of government procurement is in charge to follow and to coordinate the implementation of the legislation.

POINT 5: INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK

Government procurement Commission: Federal State-Cantons (KBBK)

The KBBK was established with the entry into force of the GPA. The KBBK aims at a faithful implementation by Switzerland of its international obligations in the area of government procurement. Its membership is equally shared by representatives of the cantons and representatives of the Federal government in charge of government procurement. Its major tasks refer to:

- a)the elaboration of the Swiss position in international fora;
- b)the **promotion** of **exchanges** of views between the **Federal** government and the **cantons**;
- c)the **elaboration** of **recommendations** on the **transposition** of international obligations;
- d)the conclusion of agreements with foreign surveillance entities;
- e)the granting of advice and acting as mediator in dispute cases;
- f)the **filing of complaints** for violation of international obligations to the federal or cantonal competent authorities under specific circumstances.

POINT 5: INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK:

Coordination Group for Construction and Property Services (KBOB)

The KBOB has, in the area of **construction**, the same competences as the BKB. These bodies have been kept **separate** because they deal with **significantly different fields**. Membership in the KBOB is made of the units of the **Federal government** (FOCL, armasuisse, ETH-Council, FORC, FOT), **the cantons** (BPUK) **and the municipalities** (Swiss associations of towns and of municipalities) dealing with construction projects. Its tasks refer to **facilitate the work of its Members** with the aim of **improved quality and saved resources**. The KBOB contributes mainly to:

- a)define the purchasing policy at the Federal government, cantons and cities level;
- b)coordinate and exchange experiences between its Members;
- c)represent its Members' interest when dealing with the construction industry;
- d)publish contracts as models, recommendations, tariffs, general conditions; and,
- **e)work** in various areas such as the elaboration of a concept for permanent training, security, inclusion of inflation in constructions' pricing, prevention of corruption and integrity clauses.

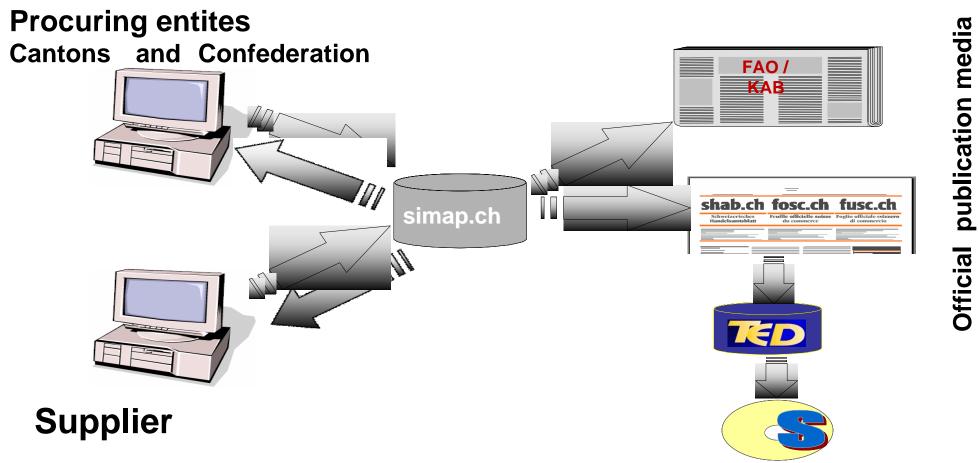

POINT (5): INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK: SIMAP = simap.ch

- Simap is an Association between the Confederation and the Cantons.
- Objective: To run and further develop a common and centralized electronic gate for information covering government procurement in Switzerland, in order to assure:
 - integrated <u>transparency</u> for all tenders in Switzerland;
 - <u>harmonization</u> of the purchase processes in Switzerland;
 - a common approach for the direct collection of statistics.
- <u>Funding</u>: The <u>development</u> of the application has been financed by the Confederation (State Secretariat of Economic Affairs) and by the association simap.ch. The future <u>running</u> of the system will be covered by the association simap.ch.
- The use by <u>tenderers</u> and <u>entities</u> will be <u>free of charge</u>.

simap.ch: KEY FUNCTIONS

- Access to the integral tender documentation available interactively
- Continued electronic process between the publication of the tender and the award
- Easy handling of the <u>linguistic diversity</u> of the publications (4)
- Selective downloading / research functions for publications
- Online <u>abonnements</u> for tenderer
- Up- and downloading of the tender documentation
- Interactive questioning / Electronic Forum for replies
- Automatic electronic gates to the cantonal administrative publications, the SHAB and TED

POINT 5 : INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK : Purchasing Commission of the Federal government (BKB)

The purchasing Commission is a **policy and coordination body** of the **Federal government** in the areas of **goods and services**. Membership is made of the largest purchasing entities of the Federal government and specialised units from various Federal departments. Its tasks refer mainly to the:

a)elaboration of the purchasing policy of the Federal government with in particular recommendations on the evolution of government procurement and tendering systems as well as the preparation of legislative projects in the field of government procurement;

b)coordination between purchasing entities;

c)elaboration of general conditions, standard contracts and tariff scales for services.

The purchasing Commission has developed an interactive support tool on internet www.gimap.ch.

POINT 5 : INSTITUTIONAL FRAMEWORK Federal Finance Control

The Federal Finance Control is an institution acting as external audit at the federal level. It aims at verifying a correct implementation of the legislation. It proceeds through special, non-systematic examinations. These examinations cover detailed analyses of specific tenders as well as horizontal aspects of several tenders. It also checks prices for large tenders - awarded without competition (limited tendering).

POINT 6: CONCLUSIONS

The <u>interaction</u> of <u>appropriate legal</u> instruments and <u>strong institutional frameworks</u> are the essential keys to implement the commitments of the GPA at the federal and subterritorial levels with outcomes as follows:

- > Provisions at national level in line with the GPA
- ➤ Provisions that secure, increase and facilitate market access opportunities and sustainable growth
- >and reduce risks of disputes and panels
- in order to promote the efficient use of public funds by generating competition among suppliers worldwide
