



1. Raising awareness



Three key challenges:

- 1.Institutional
- 2.Methodological
- 3.Cultural

The lack of general knowledge about the WTO needs to be addressed: available tolos include information sessions, workshops and technical assistance from the WTO Secretariat



- Existing programs may change or be eliminated.
- New programs must reflect existing commitments.
- WTO rules and procedures may change to include new topics or be more detailed in others.
- Trained staff may rotate or leave the institutions.

Formal monitoring mechanisms must be created to ensure the continuity of the process.



3. Ensuring transparency and accountability

- By law, the Ministry of Foreign Trade is in charge of the notification process regarding the WTO.
- A notification system keeps track of all notification commitments.
- Automatic alerts are sent regularly to the persons in charge, as well as their immediate superiors.

Sometimes a push is needed: the Secretariat regular updates and reminders, and other WTO members may help to increase the awareness on the importance of notifications in due time and form.

II. Some conclusions



- 1. Awareness is essential to increase interinstitutional cooperation
- 2. The system must be able to adapt and manage risks.
- 3. Accountability is necessary, but sometimes a little help is needed.
