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GENERALIZED SYSTEM OF PREFERENCES

Notification by Austria

The annexed notification on the preferential imports of Austria 1988 was provided by the Permanent Delegation of Austria on 5 September 1989.

Annexes A and B containing further details are available in the secretariat for inspection by interested delegations.

Notification on the preferential imports
of Austria 1988

Introduction

1. This notification contains a complete information on the imports under the GSP scheme of Austria in 1988. The following material is attached:

2. Review of preferential imports and structure, development and trends of these imports. Information is given as to

- exporting preference-receiving countries, also indicated by region, on the total amount of preferential imports,
- total amount of preferential imports, together with the percentage share from total preferential imports, also indicated by region,
- extent of aggregation of preferential trade on major exporters,
- percentage share of preferential imports from total imports and from mfn-dutiable imports, given by individual preference-receiving countries.

3. Annex A contains information on imports from all countries and territories which may receive tariff preferences under the Austrian scheme, i.e. imports from all potential beneficiaries. Information is given country-wise on

- total imports,
- total imports dutiable on an mfn-basis,
- total imports of goods covered by the Austrian scheme (potential preferential imports), and
- imports which actually received preferential tariff treatment.

4. Annex B contains information as to major preferential imports on a commodity-by-commodity basis. Only those items have been taken into account which totalled at least one million Austrian Shillings (A.Sh.) in 1988. The information indicates

- the total imports from all countries of the world of that item,
- the total value of imports of that item from preference-receiving countries,
- the total value of dutiable imports of that item from preference-receiving countries, dutiable to be understood on an mfn-basis,
- the total value of dutiable imports of that item from preference-receiving countries covered by the Austrian scheme.

- the total value of imports of that item which actually received preferential tariff treatment, and
- a splitting-up of all these figures for the four main suppliers among the preference-receiving countries.

4.1. The figures shown in Annex B are somewhat inaccurate, because the imports from Hungary are calculated as imports from preference-receiving countries for the whole calender year 1988, although Hungary became a preference-receiving country only as from 1 July 1988. For administrative reasons, however, a separate calculation of these imports for the first and the second half of 1988 was impossible.

5. Particular stress should be given to the fact that the term "dutiable imports" is to be understood to mean "dutiable on an mfn-basis". This interpretation, though being in line with international notification requirements, leads to rather unforeseen results in cases where the mfn-rates of duty are temporarily suspended by the Austrian government on a world-wide basis, whereas the same items are covered by the Austrian GSP scheme. In these case the heading is indicated as mfn-dutiable, and no preferential imports have been recorded, since all imports of this item were admitted at nil rates of duty on the basis of the temporary suspension. This applies in particular to bananas (HS No. 0803), raw coffee (Nos. 0901 11 and 0901 12), raw cocoa beans (No. 1801 A) and raw oil (No. 2709). Attention is drawn to para. 8 of the Review of preferential imports, where further information is given.

6. As far as HS chapters 1 to 24 are concerned, information in Annex B is given on a subheading level in order to enable a direct comparison with the Austrian preferential offer in the field of agricultural items. For all other items falling within chapters 25 to 97, the information is given on a four-digit heading level.

7. If not otherwise stated, all figures are given in Austrian Shillings. To facilitate conversion into US-\$, the average exchange rates for the years mentioned are given here:

**Review of preferential imports under the
Austrian GSP scheme in 1988**

Structure, development and trends

1. Total preferential imports amounted to 10.303,565.347 A.Sh.. Compared with 1987, preferential imports increased by 28,77 %. Preferential imports of products falling within HS chapters 1 - 24 amounted to 528,426.659 A.Sh. increasing against 1987 by 1,05 %. Preferential imports of products falling within HS chapters 25 - 97 amounted to 9.775,138.688 A.Sh. with a rate of increase against 1987 of 30,70 %.

5. Diversification of imports from preference-receiving countries improved somewhat in 1988, mainly due to the appearance of Hungary among these countries. The first two suppliers, again the Republic of Korea and Yugoslavia, reached together 39,78 %; together with the third supplier, again Taiwan, the 50 per cent-limit was barely surpassed (50,54 %). The first ten suppliers (Hungary reached rank number four, although preferential imports were admitted only as from 1 July 1988) totalled in 1988 85,72 % from preferential imports (in 1987 the respective figure was 85,43 %, in 1986 86,40 %, in 1985 84,40 %, in 1984 86,71 %, in 1983 87,75 %, in 1982 84,97 %, in 1981 83,84 %, in 1980 79,38 %, in 1979 82,23 %, in 1978 81,97 %, in 1977 83,30 %, in 1976 84,25 %, in 1975 83,43 %, in 1974 88,53 %, in 1973 93,44 % and in 1972 95,18 %).

7. The information given in para. 6 above shows still great variations in the degree of utilization of the benefits offered under the Austrian scheme, but in general the rate of utilization continues to improve for most preference-receiving countries. The calculation of preferential imports is shown on the basis not only of total imports from individual preference-receiving countries, but also on the basis of dutiable imports from these countries. Thus, a comprehensive and by and large realistic information is given on the effective utilization of the Austrian GSP scheme by various preference-receiving countries. It is to be understood that "dutiable imports" means "dutiable on an mfn-basis" as explained in para. 5 of the Introduction.

8. In this connexion, however, it is recalled that some very important preferential imports into Austria cannot be recorded. This applies in particular to Bananas (No. 0803), raw coffee beans (Nos. 0901 11 and 0901 12), raw cocoa beans (No. 1801 A) and crude oil (No. 2709) for which mfn-duties are temporarily suspended on a world-wide basis, although these items are covered by the Austrian scheme. For information, the 1988 import data for these four items are given below (in 1 000 A.Sh.):

From the least developed countries, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Burkina Faso, Burma, the Comoros, Gambia, Haiti, Lesotho, Nepal, Sierra Leone and Tanzania have shown up as beneficiary suppliers in 1988. The following land-locked developing countries were among the preferential suppliers: Afghanistan, Bolivia, Burkina Faso, Lesotho, Nepal, Paraguay and Zimbabwe. Among the developing island countries and territories, the following were recorded as preferential suppliers: the Comoros, Cyprus, Dominican Republic, Grenada, Haiti, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Jamaica, Macao, Madagascar, Malta, Mauritius, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Taiwan, and Trinidad and Tobago.
