The Permanent Mission of Austria has provided the following information on preferential imports under the Austrian GSP in 1989.

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**Review of Preferential Imports  
Under the Austrian GSP Scheme (1989):  
Structure, Development and Trends**

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Annexes containing further details are available in the secretariat for inspection by interested delegations.

1. In 1989 total preferential imports amounted to 13,751,498.336 A.Sh.. Compared with 1988, preferential imports increased by 33.46 per cent. Preferential imports of products falling within HS chapters 1-24 amounted to 600,164.764 A.Sh. increasing against 1988 by 13.57 per cent. Preferential imports of products falling within HS chapters 25-97 amounted to 13,151,333.572 A.Sh. with a rate of increase against 1988 of 34.53 per cent.

2. Particular stress should be given to the fact that the term "dutiable imports" is to be understood to mean "dutiable on an mfn-basis". This interpretation, though being in line with international notification requirements, leads to rather unforeseen results in cases where the mfn-rates of duty are temporarily suspended by the Austrian Government on a world-wide basis, whereas the same items are covered by the Austrian GSP scheme. In these cases the heading is indicated as mfn-dutiable, and no preferential imports have been recorded, since all imports of this item were admitted at nil rates of duty on the basis of the temporary suspension. This applies in particular to bananas (HS No.0803), raw coffee (Nos. 0901 11 and 0901 12), raw cocoa beans (No. 1801 A) and raw oil (No.2709). Attention is drawn to paragraph 9 of where further information is given.

3. As far as HS chapters 1 to 24 are concerned, information in Annex B is given on a subheading level in order to enable a direct comparison with the Austrian preferential offer in the field of agricultural items. For all other items falling within chapters 25 to 97, the information is given on a four-digit heading level.

A. Preferential import in 1989 by preference-receiving country

4. Preferential imports from the following 79 preference-receiving countries were recorded in 1989. The rank as preferential supplier for 1989 compared with 1984, 1985, 1986, 1987 and 1988 is also provided.

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If not otherwise stated, all figures are given in Austrian Shillings. To facilitate conversion into US-\$, the average exchange rates for the years mentioned are given here:

B. Preferential imports by region

5. The following tables indicate the development of preferential imports from the various regions. Due to the admission of Hungary as a preference-receiving country, which was operative for the first full year in 1989, the dynamic trend in the Asian preferential exports was less impressive than that of the European preference-receiving countries. In spite of increasing preferential imports from all regions, the preferential ratio of all regions but Europe decreased.

6. Diversification of imports from preference-receiving countries improved somewhat in 1989, mainly due to the appearance of Hungary among these countries. The first two suppliers, now Hungary and Yugoslavia, reached together 38.98%; together with the third supplier, now the Republic of Korea, the 50 per cent limit was surpassed with 51.47 %. The first ten suppliers totalled in 1989 88.63% from preferential imports (in 1988 the respective figure was 85.72%, in 1987 85.43%, in 1986 86.40%, in 1985 84.40%, in 1984 86.71%, in 1983 87.75%, in 1982 84.97%, in 1981 83.84%, in 1980 79.38% in 1979 82.23%, in 1978 81.97%, in 1977 83.30%, in 1976 84.25%, in 1975 83.43%, in 1974 88.53%, in 1973 93.44% and in 1972 95.18%).

8. The information given in paragraph 7 above shows still great divergencies in the degree of utilization of the benefits offered under the Austrian scheme, but in general the rate of utilization continues to improve for most preference-receiving countries. The calculation of preferential imports is shown on the basis not only of total imports from individual preference-receiving countries, but also on the basis of dutiable imports from these countries. Thus, a comprehensive and large realistic information is given on the effective utilization of the Austrian GSP scheme by various preference-receiving countries. It is to be understood that "dutiable imports" means "dutiable on an mfn-basis" as explained in paragraph 2.

9. In this connection, however, it is recalled that some very important preferential imports into Austria cannot be recorded. This applies in particular to Bananas (No. 0803), raw coffee beans (Nos. 0901 11 and 0901 12), raw cocoa beans (No. 1801 A) and crude oil (No. 2709) for which mfn-duties are temporarily suspended on a world-wide basis, although these items are covered by the Austrian scheme. For information, the 1989 import data for these four items are given below (in 1,000 A.Sh.):

From the least-developed countries, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Botswana, Burkina Faso, the Comoros, Ethiopia, Haiti, Laos, Lesotho, Myanmar, Nepal and Tanzania have shown up as beneficiary suppliers in 1989. The following land-locked developing countries were among the preferential suppliers: Afghanistan, Bolivia, Botswana, Burkina Faso, Hungary, Lesotho, Nepal, Paraguay and Zimbabwe. Among the developing island countries and territories, the following were recorded as preferential suppliers: the Comoros, Cuba, Cyprus, Dominican Republic, Grenada, Haiti, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Jamaica, Macao, Madagascar, Malta, Mauritius, Papua New Guinea, the Philippines, Singapore, Sri Lanka, Taiwan and Trinidad and Tobago.
